NEXT HOME GAME

The Mustangs will be at home again next Saturday night, October 14. It will be the second CCAA encounter for Cal Poly and the first at home. What makes the fare especially tempting is the fact that arch rival Fresno State will be the opponent.

Heading into tonight's game against San Fernando Valley State, the Bulldogs were winless in three outings. However, two of the three losses were by margins of eight points and one point.

Not since the 1957 campaign has a Cal Poly Football team measured the Bulldogs. Fresno's victory string is nine in a row over the Mustangs.

Coach Darryl Rogers has a colorful quarterback in Dan Robinson. The scrambling senior already has broken several of the aerial marks established by the Bulldogs' great Beau Carter. Robinson rifled a 41-yard scoring play in last year's game, a 14-7 Fresno victory.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. in Mustang Stadium.

Band Night Program to Feature Musical Trip from Coast to Coast

When Bill Johnson raises his baton, fans in the stands have come to expect an outstanding show. He kicks off his second year at Cal Poly tonight with "a really big shew!"

It's Band Night and conductor Johnson will have 350 performers under his command. Joining the 91 member Mustang Marching Band tonight are bands from Arroyo Grande, San Luis Obispo, Lompoc and Morro Bay high schools.

The musicians will transport you vicariously from coast to coast on the wings of several thousand notes. So sit back and enjoy your journey without all that fuss and confusion that customarily accompanies most of your trips.

Tonight's show is entitled "This Is My Country." The performance is in keeping with President Johnson's plea for Americans to see their own nation first.

San Francisco, New York, New Orleans and St. Louis are on the itinerary.

While the famed Rockettes may be on strike in New York, the Cal Poly version of the high kickers will perform during the stopover in New York as the musicians play "Mame" and "Another Openin', Another Show."

Band members will form a Golden Gate Bridge to illustrate the trip to San Francisco. A replica of a player piano will be formed and "Winchester Cathedral" will be the musical selection while the band takes you to New Orleans.

"America the Beautiful" will be the musical offering as the bandsmen form a peace arch during the St. Louis visitation.

Directors of the visiting high school bands are: Robert Tessitore, Arroyo Grande; Roger Leston, San Luis Obispo; John Porter, Lompoc; and Richard Shapley, Morro Bay.

Susan Heflin is the featured baton twirler during pre-game festivities.

Mustang band members are decked out in their new uniforms which cost over \$100 each.

Roy Urbach of San Bruno is the new president of the Mustang Marching Band while Steve Frank of Long Beach is the Manager. Drum majors are Jim Johnson from Vallejo and Dick Couden of Walnut Creek.

Mustangs Set to Launch Home Season Against Tough Cal Western Tonight

Debuting before a home crowd tonight is a Cal Poly football team which distinguished itself with a memorable performance a week ago against the nation's No. 1 College Division team, mighty San Diego State.

The Aztecs, scoring on a 32-yard screen pass with 4:20 to play, clawed their way to a 26-20 victory. A year ago the Mustangs of Sheldon Harden used a fine performance against San Diego State as a springboard to a 6-4 season.

Those who were in the stands for the 1966 Mustang-Aztec encounter won't soon forget that tingling 14-13 skirmish. San Diego pulled that one out by deflecting the conversion kick attempt after time had elapsed. Would you believe that Poly played a much better game last week in San Diego than it did a year ago? Well it did!

The point is that in 1966 the Mustangs were able to use the performance against San Diego as a rallying point. Will this year's edition be able to do likewise?

Poly had considerable difficulty in fashioning a 21-3 win over Cal Western a year ago. And just as in 1966, the meeting followed on the heels of a bruising battle with the Aztecs.

Leading the Westerner's into tonight's game is fullback Jackman LeBlanc. Last year when he led his team in rushing with 741 yards and a 5.5 yard average per carry he was an honorable mention Little All-America choice.

LeBlanc can do it all. A 9.7 man in the 100-yard dash, he's a threat any time he has the ball. The 195 pounder from Los Angeles has pro football aspirations and he's also interested in a career as a probation officer. His major is sociology.

In addition to being an exciting ball carrier, he is a fine blocker. He has led the Westerners in rushing the past two seasons. LeBlanc does it two ways — either bowling over tacklers or with a deceptive change of pace. Cal Poly coaches regard LeBlanc as being the equal of any back the Mustangs will face this fall. When you labor in such an outstanding conference as the CCAA, that's quite a tribute to a football player.

In Cal Western's 27-6 victory over Puget Sound a week ago LeBlanc ran for 157 yards. He has netted 276 yards and is averaging 5.8 yards per carry in 1967. He leads the Westerners in scoring with a trio of TDs and has added 40 yards on a pair of kickoff returns.

Any wonder they're saying "as Jackman goes, so goes the Westerners."

His coach, Bob Dinaberg says, "he's a very gifted boy. He has what I believe to be the three ingredients of a great running back — raw speed, power and ability to run in the open field. In addition, he can catch the football, blocks willingly and does anything else we deem necessary."

Cal Western's coach advises that LeBlanc is not

a one-man team, "but he does set a very fine example."

The Mustangs have whipped the Westerners only once in four previous meetings and that was last year. There can be no lethargic performance if they are to even their season's mark at 2-2 and hand Cal Western its first setback in three 1967 starts.

Fiery fullback Steve Arnold, a business administration major from Tollhouse in his third season as a regular, is Poly's leading rusher after three games. He has run for 132 yards and a 4.2-yard average.

Power-running junior Ron Hasson and the darting Ron Stutzman, who alternate at running back, are the Mustangs' second and third leading ball carriers. Hasson, a business major from Riverside, has slammed his 220 pounds into enemy lines for a net of 84 yards, three less than Stutzman, a 180-pounder from Pacific Grove.

Try and keep your eyes focused on the Mustangs' No. 85. That's Cecil Turner, Poly's fine split end. If you think your binoculars are going bad because things are blurred, relax. When you can run 100 yards in 9.3 as Cecil does you are prone to blurring most any view.

Opponents respect Turner's speed so much that they have been double teaming him most of the year. Still he's grabbed six passes and three of them have paid touchdown dividends. The 175-pound senior hasn't broken loose for a long scamper on a punt or kickoff return as yet. But you can expect it to happen most anytime.

Surprisingly, the Mustangs' No. 1 pass receiver after three games has been tight end Steve Hazzard. The junior physics major from Santa Monica has coddled 14 passes worth 142 yards. It was his 37-yard advance last week which set up Poly's third score and evened accounts with the Aztecs at 20-20.

Hazzard's performance has been surprising on two counts. First, he never caught a pass all last year when he was the regular tight end. Secondly, he's playing with a bandaged left ring finger, a souvenir of a May water skiing accident which nearly severed the finger. Apparently surgery to reattach the finger has been successful.

Larry McCurry, the phenominal punter, is off to his finest start as a kicker. He has punted 24 times for a 40-yard average. Already he's had a school record boot of 80 yards and other boomers of 65, 54 and 50 yards.

Defensively, the Mustangs have received some solid performances from linebacker Jack Wool, the 185-pound co-captain from San Jose, and middle guard Dale Creighton, 205-pound junior crops major from Weldon. Wool was selected as "CAA Lineman of the Week" this week for his outstanding performance against San Diego State.

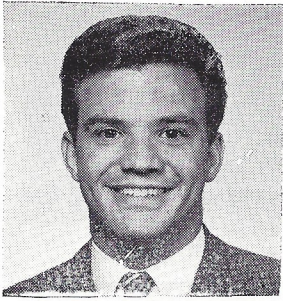
My Daddy does everything for me. He plays with my brother Danny and my sister Denise. Sometimes he plays with them too much.

I go to kindergarten. My teacher's name is Miss McDonald. She is a good teacher.

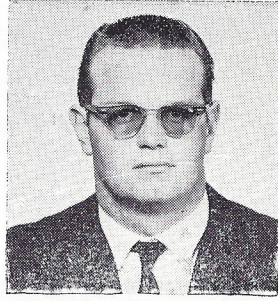
One day she had a picture of my Daddy in the paper. She asked us who was that? Everybody said that's "Coach Dooley."

I told her that wasn't Coach Dooley. "That's my Daddy."

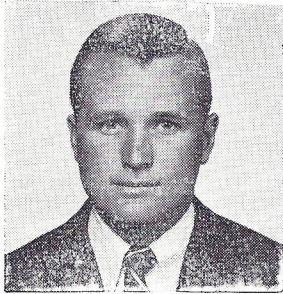
