Strong on Sports . . .

Clint Scott's magic toe provided the margin of victory last week in the final minutes of a wild game at Pomona. The Loggers' 146-pound kicking star booted the winning extra point in addition to a 42-yard field goal which figured prominently in a 10-0 Logger lead. Booting points is nothing new for Scott who now has kicked 79 of them in a UPS uniform and his 42-yard field goal was threepointer number 18 at UPS. Scott twice has booted 42-yard field goals in the past, against Hawaii last year and against Whitworth in 1966. A look at Logger records reveals (see records pages 4 and 5) Scott's name in 18 places but the most prominent must be his position as the highest-scoring player in UPS history with 133 career points. Scott began kicking soccerstyle in his junior year at Newport his school in Bellevue. As a senior he set a Kingco League record for placekicking and was given special recognition to the all-star team. He had come to Bellevue two years earlier from Boksburg, South Africa where he played soccer and competed in track. The Logger kicker rates high with us at the Goofy Goose, too. Today's Game CAL WESTERN OR USIU?

The recent renaming of California Western University to United States International University hasn't confused the University of Puget Sound football team a bit. The Loggers know that today's opponent is the same Cal Western they remember from the 1967 season . . . when the Westerners bashed Puget Sound 27-6 in San Diego's Balboa Stadium.

A new coach, Mary Braden, has taken over the USIU team, but one familiar face remains and the Loggers still have nightmares about Wayne Clark, whose passing as a sophomore two seasons ago destroyed UPS hopes. Clark tossed for 122 yards and two touchdowns, completing 11 of 25, and sneaked across for a third score in that well remembered

"Now they've got a quarterback who starts ahead of Clark," UPS coach Bob Ryan laments, "we're really in trouble." Ryan's reference is to Bill Miller, out

much of last season with a broken leg, who scored twice in directing the USIU win over Simon Fraser.

Both teams had to fight off fourth quarter drives to claim victories last week. The Loggers lost a 10-0 lead to Pomona and then erased a 16-10 Pomona advantage in the final minutes at Claremont, Calif.

The Westerners staged a goal-line defense to spill Simon Fraser 34-28 in a wild affair at San Diego.
